MAY 4 IS WILDFIRE COMMUNITY PREPAREDNESS DAY

With fire season around the corner, the County of Santa Cruz is urging all Santa Cruz County residents to work together to reduce the risk of wildfire in their neighborhoods.

May 4, 2019, is Wildfire Community Preparedness Day. Recent fire seasons brought devastation to large parts of California, while Santa Cruz County has seen several close calls, including frequent reports of wildfire attributable to unsanctioned camping, evacuations and threats to neighborhoods and natural resources. The 2017 Bear Fire consumed 391 acres and injured five firefighters, the 2016 Loma Fire (which bordered Santa Cruz County) consumed 4,400 acres, the 2009 Lockheed Fire consumed 7,800 acres and the 2008 Martin Fire consumed 520 acres.

"In the last few years, quick emergency response, luck and community preparedness have helped Santa Cruz County avoid the widespread devastation seen in other parts of California," Santa Cruz County Emergency Services Manager Rosemary Anderson said. "Longer fire seasons, more devastating fires with unpredictable weather patterns are the new paradigm, and County residents can and should take measures to minimize the risks for everyone."
