 - Climate change: why does climate matter?

- o Money: How much are we spending on disasters?
- It is real; how do we respond?
- Why did we miss out on all the rain last year?
- Atmospheric Rivers went further north (typically bring us about ½ of our precipitation)
- Alerting systems
 - Emergency Alert System (EAS)
 - Can only issue for certain events, such as Flash Flood (for debris flow)
 - o NWS active on Facebook, Twitter, YouTube
 - Code RED—sign up!
 - Mobile Alerting available to .gov partners (iNWS)-can pick areas and types of alerts; very useful and fast; can take and share with communities
- CZU Flash Flood Warning for Debris Flow Thresholds for winter months this year; will be watching rate and gauges
 - o 0.30" / 15 minutes
 - o 0.50" / 30 minutes
 - o 0.70" / 60 minutes
- El Nino/La Nina massive driver of weather in the US
 - We are looking at a La Nina winter-typically dryer
 - January March prediction to be below average precipitation
 - Could receive a large amount all at once, however—we need to prepare!
- Wind is another threat here: take down dead or diseased trees!
- Ocean is the deadliest killer in our area
 - Gives warning: you see it and feel it
 - But also can get flat and look calm, but can be sneaker waves! And water temp is 55 degrees

9.3 County Office of Education Jennifer Buesing

-Schools are increasing in-person instruction; many private schools already open, now public schools opening following a targeted schedule.

-Plan is to be open for hybrid learning. Parents who want to continue distance learning are able to do that.

-Surveillance testing isset up for all school staff.

-Many families in San Lorenzo Valley impacted; working with them and preparing them for debris flow.

-Great collaboration with Public Health; been able to isolate positive cases with staff and students.

- 9.4 Grant Updates
 - 9.4.1 FY 2017 State Homeland Security Grant Program (SHSGP) (2.75year grant; award of \$351,387)

Closed out as per 5.31.20 except for special extensions. Completed projects: Sheriff's Office-Airplane Engine; Sheriff's Office-Bomb Suits; Sheriff's Office/EOC-Generator Enclosure; Scott's Valley PD-911 Tower; CERT PPE; Scotts Valley PD-Computer Systems; Fire Service Gurneys; Fire Service ATV; Repeater for Auxiliary Communications-Bonny Doon; Medical Reserve Corp Coordination; EMS PIO Coordination

Several projects modified to enable purchases for HSA/EMS that became high priority due to COVID-19. Supply/delivery constraints made the 5.31.20 grant deadline unfeasible; Santa Cruz County and other jurisdictions were granted extensions through 12.31.2020; efforts are being made to complete by that time.

Projects in progress: EMS Mobile Medical Shelter; Emergency Medical Personnel PPE.

9.4.2 FY 2018 State Homeland Security Grant Program (SHSGP) (2.75year grant through 5.31.21; award of \$349,660) Completed projects: Watsonville Slough Stream Gage/Warning System; Sheriff's Office armored van; Equipment for CERT; radiological detection devices for County first responders.

Projects in progress: Medical Reserve Corp Coordination; HSA/EMS PIO Coordination; EMS HearNet Radio System.

9.4.3 FY 2019 State Homeland Security Grant Program (SHSGP) (2.75-year grant through 5 31.2022 award of \$359,856.
Completed projects: Mobile X-Ray Machine (ID Hazardous/Explosive Devices) for the Sheriff's Office; Equipment for CERT training.
Projects in progress: County Medical Surge Preparedness, Mass Casualty Incident Preparedness, and Active Shooter Bag for Health Services Agency/EMS; Personal Body Armor for Santa Cruz PD; Portable Bollards for Capitola Barriers (Environmental Planning and Historical Preservation (EHP) submitted and approved!); Ballistic Shields for Scotts Valley PD; Personal Body Armor for Watsonville PD; Mobile

Bomb Containment Vessel for Sheriff's Office; Mobile radios for fire agencies; Equipment for CERT training graduates; and Mobile Medical Shelter Coordination for County HSA/EMS.

9.4.4 FY 2020 State Homeland Security Grant projects were vetted and identified by the Authorized Body of Five; Advance Application submitted 1/31/2020.

Received Notification of Subaward on 10.23.2020 of \$356,972. New requirement of allocations totaling 20% of award to four National Priority Investment Justifications now requires review and changes to the initial application. Also pending: approval of request to waive regular requirement to allocate 25% to Law Enforcement projects based on major County Haz/Mat Response Team equipment project to be administered by Fire Service but equally available, shared, and deployable for Law Enforcement and Fire Service agencies.

- 9.4.5 FY2019 Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) award (2-year grant through 6.30.2021) was approved by Cal OES on 1.13.2020 for \$180,870. Grant requires 50% match (dollar-for-dollar). Projects in progress include OES staffing; EOC/OES supplies; EOC Radio Charges; ISD/GIS Staffing to Support EOC Operations; EOC facility co-location costs; Mountain Community Resources citizen preparedness activities; Resource Conservation District (RCD)/Firesafe Council planning and community activities; and OES Community Outreach and Education materials.
- 9.4.6 FY2020 Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) award (2year grant through 6.30.2022): Received notification of award on 10.20.2020, 2020 for \$180,306. Grant requires 50% match (dollar-fordollar). Due to Cal OES delays projects are in development process. Proposed projects include OES staffing; EOC/OES supplies; EOC Radio Charges; ISD/GIS Staffing to Support EOC Operations; EOC facility colocation costs; Mountain Community Resources citizen preparedness activities; and Firesafe Council planning and community activities.
- 9.4.7 FY2020 Emergency Management Performance Grant COVID-19 Supplemental (EMPG-S) award of \$95,979; Performance Period through 10.26.2021. Required 50% match will be funded entirely by Cal OES. Proposed projects, which must be related to COVID-19 activities, include Utility Vehicle; High-capacity portable battery cubes; and thermal body scanners (for temperature screening).
- 10.0 Non-Governmental Organizations

distribution of water in Boulder Creek. Activated for 3 weeks/129 CERTS

responded. This was the first full CERT activation in the County; learned a lot.

-Coordinated with Cabrillo College Nursing to provide emergency preparedness training series

-Continued to provide contact tracing and case investigation for Public Health COVID-19 response

-Provided over 1,000 hours to CZU Medical Shelters Operations and Recovery Support

shelter moves with communications coordination

-Conducting PSPS trainings to take 911 walk-up calls and relay to Netcom -Deployed to Boulder Creek during recent PSPS to provide a local communications center in the event of lost communications

-Conducting licensing classes; high response; first time doing it all online (planning more for the future)

-Working on activation policy for ARES; has been vetted and unanimously adopted by Fire Chiefs Association; will be presented to Law Enforcement Chiefs Association on Nov 10.

10.6 Equine Evacuation Cally Haber Kenneth Coale reporting:

-Dealing with aftermath of CZU fire. Almost 30% of population in the County were under evacuation orders, including many of their members.

-Most evacuations occurred at night.

-Successes occurred during and after the fires:

Evacuated 52 horses, 78 goats, 3 sheep, 10 pigs, 5 cows, 537 chickens and 2 cats.

-After evacuation: cared for 4 horses, 6 pigs, 4 cows, 1,409 chickens, 163 cats and made 17 fish stops.

-Houses served in home care mode: 198

-Total hours for evacuation 1,090; for feeding 915.

-Many challenges; will conduct after action briefing next week. Challenges noted include lack of resources at OES and Animal Services.

-Moving forward: involved with Statewide Community Animal Response Team (CART) initiative, conducting fire line safety training for animal search and rescue personnel; working with OES and Animal Services to coordinate changes in organizations; ultimate purpose to work with public so they can evacuate their own animals or safely shelter in place.

Red Cross.....Patsy Gasca

-Busy working with local fire in Watsonville supporting and placing residents; worked with Salvation Army and Metro Santa Cruz for transportation, and provided food, mental health support, and other needs.

-Working with County of Santa Cruz Health and Human Services; they've identified up to 500 Disaster Service Workers (DSWs) who need training.

-Thank you to everyone at the table; we all have a role to play. -Kudos to Rosemary Anderson, hope to collaborate in some way moving forward.

Santa Cruz County Medical Society Donna Odryna

-Proud to collaborate with this group and other County agencies. -Continuing to provide PPE support to physicians throughout the county; many private practitioners suffering diminished revenues; some under threat to lose their practices (which could make access to care a critical challenge) -Partnered with American Red Cross during CZU fires to distribute PPE to evacuation centers
