Dec-19	The Probation Department continues to support and collaborate with the multiagency AB109 Community Engagement and Education Work Group in finalizing a community-wide plan for adoption of the Blueprint for Shared Safety originally developed by Californians for Safety and Justice. The final draft report and recommendations based on extensive community input will be presented to the CCP Executive Committee in February 2020. The Probation Department will work with the District Attorney's office and other system stakeholders to implement relevant recommendations, including those related to victim restitution, restorative justice, and data collection.	
Jun-20	The final draft report of the Blueprint for Shared Safety was presented to the Community Corrections Partnership on May 28, 2020. The report was approved and phase 1 adopted as proposed. In May 2020, the Conflict Resolution Center (CRC) Provided a Restorative Justice "primer" or mini-training to Adult Division staff in order to prepare for a more extensive future training. CRC, along with the District Attorney's Office, continues to make progress on the development of the local Neighborhood Court Model Development. The Probation Department is in discussions with CRC to establish some Victim Awareness and Victim Offender Dialogue classes with Prop 47 CAFES grant dollars.	

Dec-20	The Probation Department continues to support and collaborate with the multiagency AB109 Community Engagement and Education Work Group (CEEW) in finalizing a community-wide plan for adoption of the Blueprint for Shared Safety originally developed by Californians for Safety and Justice. The final report from the planning process was approved by the Community Corrections Partnersip and presented to the Board on October 20, 2020. The CEEW is now working with Probation and the District Attorney's office to follow-up with the priority recommendations to improve services for crime survivors and to better engage them in on-going planning for the criminal justice system. The District Attorney's Office, along with CRC, successfully conducted two Neighborhood Court panels in December 2020. Amendements to CRC's contract are in progress to add Victim Awareness classes to the Prop 47 CAFES resource list to support Restorative Justice principles. A Juvenile contract with CRC expanded Victim Awareness and Victim Offender Dialogue, as well as Parent Teen Mediation services via two grants through BSCC: Title II (STAR - Stable Transitions After Reentry); and a Youth Reinvestment grant (CRYJ - Community Reclaiming Youth Justice).
Jun-21	Following the successful launch of the Neighborhood Courts (NHC) Diversion Program in December 2020, the District Attorney's Office and Conflict Resolution Center continue to hold weekly conferences. During this past quarter work has begun on training Victim Offender Dialogue facilitators, incorporating the victim/survivor voice into the NHC panels (as appropriate). Additionally, Victim Awaremeness workshops are in the planning and implementation stage, set to begin at the Probation Service Center in June 2021
